-REGARDING THE LITURGIES OF LENT -

The liturgical year tells the story of our salvation. The continual cycle of celebrations brings us from the remembrance of our parents' first fall and the first coming of Christ at Christmas, to our preparation for the second coming of Christ in the fullness of time. As we enter Lent, the liturgical year pivots in a particular way towards the height of the liturgical year, the celebration of the Resurrection of the Lord at Easter.

The liturgies of the Church present us with unique texts every time we gather for Mass. These texts, drawn from the passages we hear in Scripture, lead us to contemplate particular themes and help us with a more conscious participation in Mass.

During this Lenten season, these guides for Mass will highlight several texts: the Entrance Antiphon, the Responsorial Psalm response, the Gospel Acclamation verse, and the Communion Antiphon. These texts will be grouped together at the beginning of the guide. They will also be highlighted at their proper place in the Mass.

May these texts be an aid in your own Lenten journey "from ashes to the living font" as we walk with our catechumens and candidates to the celebration of the Sacraments of Initiation at Easter, as we accompany those who seek greater unity with Christ, and as we walk in the footsteps of those saints who have gone before us, both canonized and unknown.
